## POOF!

hat's how the Secretary of State described the failure of the current peace process. Poof! It just blew up. All of a sudden. Because the Arabs went to the UN in violation of the agreement not to do so, because the Israelis wouldn't release any more prisoners, because the Palestinians refused to recognize Israel, because the Israelis put in that demand at the last minute, because we're building in Gilo, because, because *because....zzzz*.

Diplomats don't say what they believe, or believe what they say, but if that's in fact what the Secretary thinks, he just doesn't get it. That **Poof!** had nothing to do with what we did or what they did. The so-called peace process was dead before it ever started. It never had a chance, because it was born of a deal that was fatally flawed at conception.

Israel should never have made that deal with Arafat in 1993. A few academics met in Oslo, gulled the Foreign Minister (Peres, willing as always to believe anything) into buying it, which suckered the Prime Minister (Rabin) into agreeing, which gave the American President (Carter) something to say he accomplished, and which made Arafat king of Palestine without ever asking the Palestinians whether they agreed or not. Everybody was a winner, except for the Palestinians, who got a jungle, and a thousand five hundred dead Israelis who got blown up as a result.

I wrote about this at the time: **YOU DON'T MAKE DEALS WITH TERRORISTS**; you kill terrorists. Arafat had no intention of ever making real peace and had refused every reasonable offer from the previous governments of Barak and Olmert. And after his departure things got worse. Because half of

the Palestinian population split away to Islamic Hamas in Gaza<sup>1</sup>, which absolutely refuses to be part of the deal. While the part that remains, the PA in Ramallah, has neither the stability nor the legitimacy—it's leader elected to a four-year term 10 years ago, now age 78 with no successor in sight—to make a meaningful treaty.

So there was never the slightest chance of a treaty, and the Secretary of State should have known that. Now the American administration is blaming us and leaning on us (of course; because we are the only ones who can be leaned on!) and friend Noel writes in to tell us we're losing the propaganda war. I wrote back:

You're right, Noel, of course. We are losing the propaganda war. Thing is, we will always lose it because we can never win it.

First thing is an absolute Arab rejection of our right to exist. That absolute and extreme position exists even though it is against the self-interest of the Arabs themselves. They know it too. They don't mind death, starvation and misery; as long as we are destroyed in the end. Their religion simply does not allow them to recognize the legitimacy of a Jewish state in the Middle East. Therefore there can never be a settlement between Jews and Muslims. There will always be a conflict.

AND THE SO-CALLED TWO STATE SOLUTION IS A JOKE. HOW CAN THERE BE TWO STATES WHEN ONE OF THE STATES (US) WILL NEVER EVER BE RECOGNIZED BY THE OTHER ONE?

As for the rest of the world, two factors come into play:

**First**, Europe is full of Muslims, who form the work force to run the machines and who are violent by nature and tradition (there's never been a democracy in the Middle East for them to have grown up in) and profoundly convinced they have the final revelation of truth. Which they are committed to spreading, by force if necessary. Europe is afraid of the violence because violence is bad for business, and will always side with the Muslims, just to keep them quiet.

**Second**, European Christianity has been persecuting and killing Jews for 2000 years. Anti-Semitism is in their blood. So supporting the Muslims and blasting the Jews comes naturally, and is an easy and useful public policy to boot.

**Conclusion**, the Europeans, and the UN, will always support the Muslims against the Jews, either for the first or the second reason, or both.

**America** is a little more complicated, because classical Christian anti-Semitism is not that deep generally, and the Jewish community is strong and influential. In addition, the evangelical Christian community, which is large and important, is—for a lot of reasons—very pro-Israel.

So America is divided between what its people want, which is good for the Jews, and what its official foreign policy—written during and after WW II by the State Department (classic Protestant; not particularly philo-Semitic) which is not so good for the Jews. America will support Israel materially, because that wins elections, and condemn it politically, especially when it has a government which doesn't understand the problems (and certainly not the Arabs!) and whose reactions to solving them are modeled after what maybe works in inner-city politics.
